## **2022 Annual Meeting Voting Results**

Thank you to those of you who attended our 2022 virtual annual meeting and/or submitted your ballots. The results of the ballot items were as follows:

- 1. Ballot Item #1: Election of members to fill four vacancies on the Board of Directors: Mark Bernstein, Amy Carrigan, Don Meehan, and Ned Smith
- 2. Ballot Item #2: External audit waiver passed (78% agree, 22% opposed, based on 172 votes cast).
- **3.** Ballot Item #3: Budget ratification passed (96% agree, 4% opposed, based on 590 eligible votes). Note: The budget ratification is based on the total number of eligible votes (590), regardless of the number of votes cast (per RCW 64.90.525).
- **4. Ballot Item #4:** Bylaws amendment passed (77% agree, 23% opposed, based on 172 votes cast). Read the <u>amended bylaws</u> on the <u>Sierra website</u>.

### Water System Update by Glen Kitzmann



The water main replacement project on Ft. Ebey Rd between Balboa and San Juan St. was completed in February. The contractor replaced approximately 300 feet of old 4-inch steel piping with 6-inch C900 piping, which is the more up-to-date material. They also replaced four valves in the street, a fire hydrant and put in new meters in for four connections. The project took several weeks to complete. We also had this contractor

replace a feed line and install a blow off valve on El Sol while they were here. We were pleased with the work the contractor did.

The project to replace the treatment basin at the water plant is still in progress. The engineer is still working on the plans. I am hopeful that will be done soon so we can obtain approval from the State Department of Health and then go out to bid. We are still pushing to get this project done this year.

We are currently working with the hydrologist and the State Department of Ecology on the approval process for the water rights for the two new wells. When we have a better idea of when this might be completed, we will report it at a board meeting and let you know in a future news update.

The spring flushing of our water mains is scheduled for Thursday, April 7th and Thursday, April 14th. As usual, this will take place between 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. each day. Please do not use water during that time. You can fill a couple of buckets to help you flush toilets during that time and put some soapy water in your sinks to wash hands. This flushing is needed as we have been getting some reports of occasional discolored water at a few residences in the past few weeks. This is in part do to some of the work that has been done on our system as well as the settling basin not working as efficiently as it should. We also recently had a valve on one of our water filters stick which did not allow it to function properly. These valves have been in the process of being replaced. There are about 25 of them so it takes some time to get that work done.

We were recently notified of a water leak on La Mesa. This was a significant leak that was repaired quickly when it was found. We do not know yet how long it had been leaking, but may have been a contributor to our large water loss numbers. We will have a better idea after the end of June meter readings.

Our water system is not cheap to run and maintain so your timely payments of your water bills are appreciated. Updates on all the projects are given at the monthly board meetings. You can either attend the board meetings or read the minutes posted on our <u>website</u> for updates.

## Buildings & Grounds and Clubhouse Update by Don Jaques

#### **CLUBHOUSE IS AVAILABLE**

At the March board meeting, a new procedure was approved making use of the clubhouse more accessible to community members. Want to lead a community interest group that is open to Sierra members? There is now NO COST to do so! There is now a lower cost for small private gatherings of 20 people or fewer (\$40) and the standard cost of \$100 remains for private gatherings of more than 20 people. It is one of the most popular sports for seniors in America and just recently became the court game for Washington State. It was invented here in Washington. ## **NEIGHBORHOOD PLEAS** by Ned Smith

- 1. PLEASE do not speed there is a 25 mph speed limit on all Sierra streets. Most of the speeding is done on the longest, major streets being La Mesa, Fort Ebey, and San Juan.

## North Whidbey Fire and Rescue (NWFR) Wants Your Opinions

You will soon be receiving some mail requesting that you participate in a short survey from the North Whidbey Fire and Rescue (NWFR) Citizens Advisory Committee.

The mailing will also contain a short fact sheet on NWFR current operations. I'm hoping you will take the time to read through the fact sheet and fill out the survey.

NWFR serves the Sierra Neighborhood with Fire Suppression and Basic Life Support services. When you call 911 – personnel from NWFR are our First Responders. The district serves the unincorporated portions of North Whidbey Island – from the Deception Pass Bridge down to Fort Ebey State Park and Penn Cove. Within this territory, NWFR does not serve the City of Oak Harbor and the Naval Air Station.

The Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) for NWFR is a small group of citizens living within the fire district to provide input and recommendations regarding their Capital Facilities Plan, Vehicle Replacement, Staffing, and Finance/Funding. The results of this survey will help focus our work and recommendations.

## Disaster Preparedness: Behind the Scenes and Save the Date

The October 2021 Shake Out Drill was a success with 12 of our 13 Zones participating. From that event, volunteers stepped forward to form our first ever Volunteer Disaster First Aid Team. This team of four experienced health care workers will assist Sierra Zone Captains with basic first aid needs in the event of a disaster when Island County First Responders are overwhelmed. The talents of our neighbors are amazing!

The Disaster Preparedness Committee is excited to host its first educational event since the onset of Covid. You may recall the many compelling and well attended events held at the clubhouse in previous years. The Committee will continue this tradition of community preparedness by offering an outdoor event on the lawn outside the clubhouse on June 4th at 10 am. This event will include four short presentations on Stop the Bleed; Sierra communications, developing a "Go Bag"; and neighborhood, local, state and federal connectivity in the event of a disaster. Our feature speaker will be Eric Brooks who manages Island County Emergency Operations. Like our previous events, there will be refreshments and door prizes.

Island County is hosting a free, 20 hour CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) training event in Oak Harbor on May 20th - 22nd. This training course contains excellent and essential information for island residents to help them respond more effectively in the event of a disaster when First Responders and government resources are overtaxed or unavailable. ## Curiosity Corner – Five Spring Things You Won't Want to Miss by Sandi Bumpus

Real estate ads often refer to Whidbey Island as "a little piece of paradise." For those of us fortunate enough to live here, it is sometimes difficult to leave, if even briefly. Managing today's uncertainties may make it tempting to hunker down in the serenity of this place, however, the challenges we face can also serve as a reminder that we should never take for granted the amazing region we are privileged to call home.

Concerned about the astronomical cost of fuel as you contemplate a Sunday drive? Turn that necessary errand to Costco or Trader Joes into an adventure by taking the scenic route coming or going. Below are Five Spring Things that are detour-worthy.

#### 1. Skagit Valley Tulip Festival - April 1-30, 2022 - Mount Vernon, WA

Englishman George Gibbs arrived on Orcas Island in 1892, and later settled in the Skagit Valley. Little did the apple farmer know that his would be a legacy of tulips and daffodils. After a small crop of bulbs was a success, he received advice from those partial to windmills and wooden shoes about the art and science of bulb farming. Gibbs then imported 15,000 bulbs from the Netherlands that he



planted from Bellingham to Mount Vernon. Today, a trip through these historic farms and fields in and around Mount Vernon astound the visitor with over a million blooming tulips, daffodils, and irises. Visitors can walk through many of the fields, snap frame-worthy photos, buy fresh-cut flowers, and learn cultivation techniques to try to replicate at home. Hopefully, they will also advise how to discourage Bambi from making them a midnight snack...

#### 2. Pacific Northwest Quilt and Fiber Arts Museum - 703 South Second St., La Conner, WA



Another Englishman named George Gaches made his own mark in the Skagit Valley. In 1871, the successful owner of the first mercantile in La Conner commissioned the construction of a three-story Tudor home with a grand turret on a property large enough to support the homes of both George and his brother, James. Known as the Gaches Mansion, this impressive structure has worn many hats; Victorian home, hospital, apartments, vacant eyesore, and now, an arts and education center. Today, its collection of textile arts draws artists, crafters, and thousands of annual visitors. Be one of them!

#### 3. The Breadfarm - 5766 Cains Ct., Bow, WA

On a side street in the tiny town of Bow (originally called Brownsville) there is a tiny store that offers up comfort and kindness in their naturally leavened artisan breads using locally-sourced and milled grains. From their ability to innovate and survive during COVID with a walk-up window and curb-side pick-up to their "Adopt-a-Loaf" program where fresh bread is delivered to food banks, Breadfarm is true to its motto, "Creating goodness by committing to quality, community, people, and tradition." See if you can get all the way home before taking a dive into that bread bag!

#### 4. Eagle Spotting in Samish Flats - Edison, Bow, and Bay View (Winter into early Spring)

Once you pick up your bread in Bow, take some of the back roads in the Samish Flats area while working your way back to Highway 20 and keep your eyes peeled for the biggest cottonwood tree on the western horizon. It's not called "The Eagle Tree" by local birders for its chickadees, but for the multiple bald eagles that often perch there scanning for prey. It's said that short-eared owls and harriers can also be spotted where the Samish River dumps into the bay in this area. Tip: Stash your binoculars or spotting scope in the trunk before you go.



#### 5. Mount Erie, Fidalgo Island

Beating Whidbey's high point of 520 feet at over 1,275 feet, the summit of Fidalgo Island's Mount Erie overlooks Pass Lake to the south and Anacortes and the San Juans to the north, with views of the Cascades and the Olympics from several viewpoints as the road winds up to the summit. Access the driving route on Mount Erie Road south of Anacortes or look for the trail markers near Pass Lake if you're up for a workout.
